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The Time after Pentecost

This is what we used to call it, remember...? Now we refer to this time as Ordinary Time. But there is something special about the former label. It was a reference to Spirit time. But it didn't specify what the Spirit was up to. In both references, we need to ponder what the Spirit is doing in this time after Pentecost, this Ordinary Time.

Most of those reading this reflection are baptized...but long ago. We need to be reminded that we are still in formation. The time after the big feasts, the time after Pentecost is the time for ongoing formation in discipleship. We are far from being "done." Rather, we are either just beginning, for we are in the middle of something we are trying to figure out about this discipleship business. That's why the Sunday readings are so important. Dear Great-Grandmother Church gathers us around and has something to tell us each Sunday. If we listen up, we advance in our formation, our mystagogy. If we just come and go, or if we don't even gather with the community, we don't advance...we more or less tread water...we just keep doing the old tried and true. Maybe we don't even know we are in formation.

July is usually quite a hot month here in the Midwest. We are in the midst of summer gatherings and travels. It is in the midst of this "off" time that the formation goes on, for this time brings its own challenges to our faith-life. It's a green time. Growth is everywhere. The rains have made everything lush green, and the corn is higher than usual. This is our clue. This time is about growth. The Spirit is about "Sonning" us. Yes, the coming and the giving of one's self is growing in us. We are living from the Paschal Mystery…we are practicing dying and rising. Each Sunday in July brings us a growth-challenge. Ask yourself what it is each week. May you become lush green and fruitful.

My living Lord, Ever greening in me by the power of your Spirit, Give me the courage to speak what I believe in hope... Even if it falls on deaf ears· Call me aside to take a deep Spirit-breath and go on· Feed us with your very self...dying and rising in us... Be our bread broken and shared·

14th Sunday in Ordinary Time | Mark 6: 6

May we all be able to rest in the joyful experience of quiet contemplation with Jesus.

17th Sunday in Ordinary Time | John 6: 1-15

Our Gospel story here features the miracle of Jesus feeding five thousand people from five loaves of bread and two fish. One of my early teachers entitled this pericope, "The Barley Boy." Her interpretation was uncomplicated yet profound. Jesus did not actually multiple the food. Jesus effectively encouraged the thousands of people to share their food.
