The Church would have us reflect on death and resurrection. We are not to fear death, and we are to put our trust in the fact that we will be raised as Jesus was raised. Sunday, November 6, 2022 | Thirty-Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

Second Book of Maccabees 7:1-2, 9-14, Second Letter of St. Paul to the Thessalonians 2:16-3:5, Luke 20:27, 34-38

Sunday, November 13, 2022 | Thirty-Third Sunday in Ordinary Time

Malachi 3:19-20a, Second Letter of St. Paul to the Thessalonians 3:7-12, Luke 21:5-19

On this last Sunday of Ordinary Time, there is a warning from Jesus: "The days will come when . . ." We must fill in the blanks for our lives today. But Jesus reassures us: "I shall give you a wisdom in speaking that all your adversaries will be powerless to resist or refute...by your perseverance you will secure your lives." Sunday, November 20, 2022 | Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe Second book of Samuel 5:1-3, Letter of St. Paul to the Colossians 1:12-20, Luke 23:35-43

Do you remember the words of the Taize song: "Jesus, remember me when you come into your Kingdom?" If we reflect on the deeper meaning of those words, we could take comfort in Jesus' response: "Today you will be with me in Paradise." Or we may realize that there is more ... we have a responsibly to see that the kingdom of God takes shape in our daily lives. How do we do this?

Sunday, November 27, 2022 | First Week of Advent

Isaiah 2:1-5, Letter of St. Paul to the Romans 13:11-14, Matthew 24:37-44

St. Paul says to the Romans: "Throw off the works of darkness and put on the armor of light." A timely message when darkness comes earlier each day. May our eagerness to decorate our homes with Christmas lights reflect our desire to honor the birth of the one who is the Light of the World. Jesus says: "Stay awake, be prepared! We do not know the day or the hour." The kingdom is now! In this Advent time, how do we search for God's presence? What do we hear, see or know?
